#### **Assessment**

There will be 3 written examinations at the end of year 13 which each account for a third of the overall grade achieved.

# What you will study?

Students will begin by studying the English Legal system in order to understand the nature of law in England and Wales.

They will then build on this foundation with the introduction of criminal law. They will learn to analyse and apply this information to a range of questions, focusing particularly on scenario-based questions, in order to form detailed legal arguments.

In year 13 the students will continue to develop their legal knowledge while studying tort law and one additional topic (Contract Law or Human Rights Law).

They will also develop their critical awareness of the law.
