End of Year Exams

How to help your Child revise.

As we enter the end of year test season, we wanted to give you a few tips on how to support your child with revision.

We want to reassure you that you do not have to teach your child subject content – in fact quite the opposite. One of the most successful revision strategies is to let your child teach you! Ask them questions about what they are revising and get them to explain the maths problem or the ideas behind photosynthesis for example.

So here are some top tips we have discussed as teachers and parents that may help:

- 1. Check your child knows what topics they need to revise. Your child's teacher will have provided revision lists on Edulink.
- 2. Check what your child is actually doing. You may think they are studying but are they in fact, on their phone or playing video games!

You can support them by helping them to write a revision timetable.




3. Create a space for your child to revise if possible.

Maybe their bedroom is not the best space, but the kitchen or dining room may help support them

- 4. Allow posters! Remember those foundation stage paintings we used to put on the fridge. Now revision posters with key facts and pictures can take their place.
- 5. Support your child to write their own revision or flash cards. These have questions on one side and key points or diagrams on the other. They can use their books or revision guides to write the cards and then you or a younger sibling can test them. Some students use index cards, but paper cut up will work just as well.

6. Your child may find it easier to make mind maps rather than posters or flash cards. These can be hand drawn or computerised but have a few key rules. Place the topic or question in the middle of the page. Break the topic down into sub-headings. Then add contents off each sub heading that link. Here is a useful short video that explains the process: Step by Step directions for creating a mind map (youtube.com)



7. There are lots of revision websites online with videos to support many subjects. Your child's subject teacher will be able to recommend some. For example, in Maths we use MathsWatch.

Your child will have a personalised login, for example, in year 7 it is:

23hpotter@wa – where 23 is the September when the year group joined the school, their first initial then their surname@wa. All passwords are circle. This site has videos which pause to let students try some answers. There are also interactive questions that are marked on each topic. Your child can use the video to write posters or flash cards and then practice the questions. They revise Maths by doing Maths. Just check that they have clicked on the correct Key stage KS3 or GCSE.

8. Our final key tip is about mobile phones. Research shows that having a mobile phone in the same room while studying is a distraction. This causes students to lose focus more easily and have problems concentrating. So, supporting your child by insisting their phone is in a different room is proven to improve their ability to study.

Most of all we do not want your child to feel over-anxious about these tests. These are end of year tests and are the same as the ones we have completed in class all year. They should be low stakes. They give us an idea of how to support your child and improve our planning moving forward. These tests only form a part of the information we use on end of year reports. The work your child has produced all year in class and for homework is just as important.

If you have any queries about the tests in a particular subject, please contact your child's subject teacher, all other queries should go to your child's tutor.

As always, students continue to impress us in the English department!


